Introduction

Who are we?

Lingo Flamingo provide the world's first portfolio of tailored outreach language workshops to older adults, delaying the effects of dementia and brain ageing by keeping older adults' brains fit and active. Founded 8 years ago, we have provided over 10,000 classes to adults across Scotland. We also have a Language Nest in Shawlands where we offer community language classes for adults. These classes are run on a semester basis, both in-person and online for a period of 10 weeks each semester. We run 4 semesters every year.

Aims of Report

The purpose of this report is to show the range of beneficiaries we have reached over the last year and to illustrate the impact we have created through surveys, quotes, pictures, and case studies from our students, stakeholders, and staff.

Format of Report

The report is split into two main sections. Firstly, the impact of the care homes is showcased, after which the impact created by the hub is reviewed. Both sections will initially outline the numbers of people reached and the projects delivered. Thereafter, additional quantitative data gathered through surveys will be presented, after which both sections will highlight some of the depth of the impact created through qualitative methods such as quotations and case studies. Some pictures are included to help give a visual representation of the impact created through the language classes. This year we have also included information regarding our tutors' experiences as well as the changes we have made towards becoming a greener organisation.

Lingo has supported 900 older adults, across 57 care homes, with 54 of our students achieving an SQA qualification. We have run a total of 1,130 Hub classes.






There have been 51 surveys completed with participants from our care home projects this year. Here is an overview of their responses:




Did this course help you in communicating/expressing yourself? (44 responses)

Case Study: David Cargill House, Glasgow

Overview:

In 2023, we ran a few different projects with our partners at David Cargill House in Glasgow. We collected some data from the participants, our tutor Carolyn and the manager, Abi.

What they said:

Abi, Manager at David Cargill House:

"I think that learning a new language provides insight into culture, history, and tradition. Learning a new Language is not only a practical skill but also an enhancement to service users' cognitive, social, and cultural skills, all of which can positively impact the service users' daily routine in many ways. It gives our service users a sense of achievement, it enhances their communication skills, increases their memory and they feel so proud!

Carolyn, Lingo Flamingo tutor:

"They are so willing to get involved. They love singing and I really think that gets them into the rhythm of the classes. They are really nice ladies who support each other throughout the classes. It is not just them who have learned new things - even though I taught in school for 35 years, I feel I have learned a huge amount about teaching from working with older participants."



Kathleen, participant:

"You form friendships in the classes, the tutor is very good. You don't feel embarrassed about making mistakes - everybody makes mistakes and you just carry on and try your best. You learn things about yourself and everything is possible."





Harry's Story

"I am Harry Reid. I am nearly 63 now. I have always enjoyed languages. I did some French in school and always tried to pick up some words when travelling. I've travelled a lot in the UK and France and a little in Germany. If you travel and you know some phrases, people appreciate it, it's the fact that you're trying!

I had cancer... I lost contact with a lot of friends when I got cancer. I couldn't get out much because my immune system was so weak. I managed to get over that and then I got Alzheimer's disease and ended up here in Nicol Street (the Alzheimer Scotland Resource centre). Then I found out about Lingo Flamingo and thought, yeah why not!

At 63, trying to pick up another language I thought would be too hard, but it turned out easier than I thought because the tutor was very patient. I enjoyed it and couldn't wait to come to each lesson every Wednesday. I learned age isn't a barrier to learning. I was over the moon about getting my SQA and showed it to everybody!



"Recently I started reconnecting with people and I told everyone I was learning Spanish and getting a qualification from SQA and my friends were amazed! Now I enjoy trying things I've never done before.



In the summer of 2023, we undertook a survey with our hub students. 38 students responded and here is what they had to say:
















Would you like to continue learning with us? (38 responses)

"Excellent class. Relaxed approach with a wide range of interesting topics. You don't realise how much you have covered until you check back and see how much you've progressed."


Things to work on:



"Keep up the conversational side to build confidence in using Spanish. Maybe more on pronunciation. I use the exercises on the portal."












Student Spotlight Hub Classes

Sam has been with us since 2019 and has, to date, completed 12 semesters. She began with a Spanish Chick class and has now moved up to Fledgling classes. Sam's progression is something to be celebrated all around, so we sat down for a wee chat with her to discuss language learning with Lingo, progression, the value of continued learning and the enjoyment she gets out of her classes!

What made you start the classes at Lingo Flamingo?

I spent some time at uni in France and since then have always loved being able to communicate in another language. I wanted to learn a second and one of my best friends lives in Madrid so Spanish seemed like the perfect choice. I started in late 2019 (I think) and haven't looked back. I found Lingo online when I was googling local classes and really loved the business model and ethos behind language learning. My gran passed away recently after a long fight with Alzheimer's and so Lingo Flamingo's alignment with dementia prevention and brain health has always made it feel like the perfect fit!



I started with practically no Spanish at all in the Chick class and since then have grown to being able to give it a go and converse when I am travelling. I have a long way to go but I have the confidence to practise and love taking the opportunity when I am in Spain.



Do you have any tips for continued learning?

Pure perseverance, I think! I really look forward to my structured classes with LF but try to expose myself to Spanish where possible - with Duolingo, by watching Spanish TV shows and films and practising when I can. Even if you are not understanding everything (or sometimes anything - see Narcos, Mexico!) at least you are surrounded by the sounds of the language.

How do you find the Lingo Flamingo classes?

I love them. I have some regular faces in class now who I really enjoy seeing every week and catching up and the classes are always really well set out with a good mix of conversation, listening, reading etc.

When you're not at Lingo Flamingo, what do you get up to?

I work for an engineering firm in Glasgow and love anything active. I play volleyball and love travelling and walking my big daft dog Monty who frequently joins our classes on the video.







Our Tutors

This year we also undertook a tutor survey to gather feedback from our tutors and to implement suggestions to improve our services. Here is a summary of some of the key data from the 10 participants:


How do you rate Lingo Flamingo as an employer and the working environment? (10 responses)




How do you rate Lingo Flamingo as an employer and the working environment? (10 responses)

Our Environmental Impact

In 2023, we were lucky enough to get funding through the Net Zero programme. As part of this programme, we had a net zero coordinator who worked with us over a 4-month period to benchmark our environmental impact and to make suggestions about how we could make positive changes in our operations to reduce our carbon footprint. To continue the work started by Barbara, we started a green ambassadors committee which incorporates a tutor (Reiko), a staff member (Rosi) and a board member (Lesley). Below are some measures we have made to help us become a greener, more responsible organisation:

Books:

We have adopted a recycling policy to reduce the number of new books purchased. We have created a library for book sharing. In addition, we are developing an Al based language portal for Nest students to increase the quality of our provisions and to reduce the need for grammar books. In addition to these measures, we have reviewed our care home workbooks and have reduced the size of the book by 20% to decrease the amount of paper being printed.

Heating:

Lingo have invested in blankets to reduce electricity use and to make the Nest cosier and more comfortable in the winter months for our students. Going forward, we would like to improve the insulation of the hub.

Nest waste:

So far, we have decreased the use of plastic in the hub by buying a natural sponge and using refillable soap. We have also reduced our plastic use by switching from plastic milk pods and replacing them with sachets.

Messaging:

In addition to the practical changes we have made this year, we have also shared our environmental journey and have asked our stakeholders and students to reflect upon their own carbon footprint.

Conclusion:

It has been a very encouraging year and we have made some positive strides forward with regard to our environmental impact. We have managed to benchmark our carbon footprint, so hopefully this time next year we will have more quantitative data and will be able to directly contrast and compare the figures to clearly measure the changes we have put in place.
